Volunteering / Retirement

We hope to do`some more planting this coming autumn in a different part of the park



Blue tits – that's how it all began. Having watched these engaging little birds building their nests, I responded to a request for bird box sightings; one thing led to another and, before I knew it, I was a fully paid-up member of the Friends of Williamson Park (FoWP) with a weekly slot on the bird feeding station rota.

I'd seen posters about the FoWP Group and their Monday / Thursday morning sessions but, still working full-time, the Group work days weren't an option for me and I assumed that meant I couldn't be a member. The Group knew better. Having admitted an interest in birds that was that. No reason why you can't be a member they said. You can still attend the general meetings they said. We're happy to see you; just contribute where you can.

This was 2017 and the start of something which has developed into regular bird box observation sessions each spring, nest box cleaning each autumn, Big Garden Bird Watch each winter and involvement in the Emily Williamson memorial event with the RSPB last year.

It has also opened the door to other like-minded groups under the Green Spaces banner leading to weekend sessions planting trees in Ryelands Park and Miss Whalley's Field, membership of the Scotch Quarry Gardening Group and Closing Loops Community Composting Scheme.

Many of the festoon of lights in the Dell have been smashed. Sentry style litter bins have been damaged and some have been pushed down the embankment.

Also, the following damage occurred in the daytime, when the Memorial was open. On the upper balconies, names, comments etc. have been scratched into the stonework!!

Why, oh why, does this happen time after time? The Park is for the enjoyment of the people of Lancaster and the surrounding areas. Not for the mindless few who wreak havoc. If you see such acts being committed, do not approach those concerned, but report them to the police on 101, or inform the Park management or staff. Sadly, CCTV does not even seem to deter them!!


During this years snowdrop season some of the 'Friends' took a day out to visit Lytham Hall, Lytham. The hall is a grade 1 country house and parkland managed by Heritage Trust for the North West. It was opened in 1764 and is situated one mile from Lytham town centre. The park covers around 78 acres of wooded parkland. There are various functions and workshops on specialist subjects, There are the Tearooms, an animal hub and Garden hub. There are also tours round the Georgian Hall. There is in February an amazing display of snowdrops throughout the whole estate. The Hall does have its own gardens and parkland manager Alan Hulme who also holds training sessions in the garden. The gardens are well established and maintained by volunteers who meet every Tuesday and Thursday, I was amazed to see at least twenty five volunteers all busy working in the gardens in early February. A visit like this really needed finishing off with some refreshment in the Tea Rooms. I can only say this was first class, a good variety of meals and snacks are on offer at a very reasonable price and well worth a visit at any time of the year.

We have hired a wood chipper to clear lots of dead wood around the Park and volunteers are involved in this project.

The two Tree Routes— Exotic Trees and Native routes are in the process of being redrawn, new numbers being put on the trees. A new leaflet to all the trees should be out soon.

The Bird enclosure in Fenham Carr has been repaired by members and a fresh covering of wood chips have been spread. Please do not feed the birds as food lying on the ground only encourages vermin.
