Brief for the delivery of Evaluation for the project Abyssinia: re-appraising a colonial era legacy of the King's Own Royal Regiment

To evaluate the short-term outputs and medium-term outcomes of the Abyssinia Project. feeding back during the project to enable improvements while the project is being undertaken and also to produce a report at the end of the project that can inform the Trustees of the King's Own, staff at Lancaster City Museums and the MA/Esmee Fairbairn.

Project Aims

The project aims to :

- locate, research, document, digitise (where appropriate) and ensure proper storage for the objects that came into the King's Own collections from the Abyssinia Expedition, as well as to place them online in a more accessible form and context than is currently the case.
- make connections and enter into dialogue with relevant organisations within the UK and overseas such as the National Museum of Ethiopia, the Ethiopian Embassy, the British Council as well as museums and museum organisations such as the Army Museums Ogilby Trust, the Museums Association and the National Army Museum and the Royal Engineers Museum (who have undertaken similar work in relation to General Gordon's Sudanese Campaign).
- work with experts to appropriately engage with relevant communities within this country e.g. the Ethiopian community in Manchester
- engage with the Decolonisation Network at Lancaster University and also the Lancaster Black History Group both of whom are keen to support this project
- bring this work together into a re-interpretation/display of the area of the museum that addresses the Abyssinia Expedition

• work with Trustees and Lancaster City Museums to write a Restitution & Repatriation Policy for the King's Own Museum and also Lancaster City Museums.

Overview of Lancaster City Museums and the King's Own

Lancaster City Museums are managed by Lancaster City Council. They comprise four Accredited Museums, Lancaster City Museum, Lancaster Maritime Museum, the Cottage Museum and the King's Own Royal Regiment Museum (which displays the collection of the King's Own Royal Regiment Museum Trustees under a partnership agreement).

Since 2018 the KORR Museum Trustees have been developing the role of the Trust with the assistance of the AIM 'Prospering Boards' programme. Their public vision statement is 'To be a leader in military and regimental museums, creating connection with stories of ordinary people doing extraordinary things.'

The Trustees are fully behind the ambition of Lancaster City Museums to develop the City Museum site and widen and diversify their audiences. To this end they are starting to take an active, rather than passive, role in the development of the KORR Museum and wish to develop their skills and coherence as a team of Trustees, all of whom have been recruited for particular skills and knowledge that they bring.

Lancaster City Museums are actively working on programmes of work to increase diversity within their workforce, volunteers and audiences as well as to build upon the digital and inperson service that they deliver. This is with a view to a transformation of the museums service within the next 10 years. The City Museums vision for Lancaster is that 'This is a place where the past is part of a thriving future' with key impacts for measuring success of Engagement, Accessibility, Collaboration, Participation, Inspiration and Resilience.

The Abyssinia Project

The Napier Expedition to Abyssinia was both a rescue mission and a punitive expedition against Emperor Tewodros II of Ethiopia by the British Indian Army. The 1st Battalion, King's Own Royal Regiment, was one of three British battalions deployed as part of the force. The Expedition saw 700 of Emperor Tewodros' soldiers killed and 1,200 wounded. Of the British forces only 20 men were injured and none killed. Emperor Tewodros committed suicide, and his palace was looted by the 33rd (Duke of Wellington's) Regiment.

The looted items were recovered from the soldiers and were auctioned off afterwards with the money being divided amongst the Regiments involved. The King's Own collection contains some of these items, many of which are related to the Ethiopian Orthodox (previously described as Coptic) church.

What we aim to do with this project is to take a significant step forward in terms of the King's Own in addressing the colonial-era legacy of the Regiment. As has previously been expressed, telling the regimental story in the context of the colonial-era is challenging. We hope that this project will help to provide a much-needed way forward for other small regimental museums.

The Trustees of the King's Own are very conscious of their responsibilities to not only the peoples of the Empire that the Regiment encountered, but also to the memory of the soldiers who served, many of whom committed acts of great bravery in serving their country. This is the specific challenge that regimental museums face as they look to address their activities in the colonial sphere. It is hoped that part of the legacy of this project will be to have found a way forward that respects all perspectives and attempts to address these challenging issues with fairness, honesty and courage.

The Project Officer Eyob Derillo has been working on this two year project for the last year. Eyob brings a great deal of personal expertise to the project as a museum and library professional, with an extensive experience in collections and community engagement. He has curated several exhibitions and contributed to the curatorial work of the Asian and African Collections Department at the British Library in London since 2013. He is also a PhD candidate at SOAS University of London, where he is researching concepts and the practice of Ethiopian 'magic' medicine and divination within an African Christian context.

Since the project has commenced, new items in the collection have been uncovered and documented and further understanding has been gained. The project is now at the stage where community engagement with the collections is due to commence and we are actively working to prepare items for the website.

- an understanding of why people engaged and what they learned or experienced
- an assessment of what needs to be done to achieve the long-term outcomes as outlined in the project logic model.
- o provide clear conclusions and recommendation to help learning.
